1. Brief History

Children Welfare Centre Trust: A Journey of Excellence in Quality Education empowers individuals with the knowledge, skills, and confidence to realize their potential. This belief drove a group of dedicated visionaries to establish the Children Welfare Centre Trust over four decades ago. The Trust, registered under the Public Trust Act of 1950, was created to ensure education reaches every strata of society, fostering holistic development and universal citizenship.

Now in its 44th year, the Children Welfare Centre stands as a beacon of advanced education in Mumbai's cosmopolitan landscape. Its success is evident in the accomplishments of its students and alumni, a result of the unwavering dedication of its founders, faculty, and the strong relationship nurtured with parents and society at large. Located in Andheri, the Centre offers a safe, well-equipped campus conducive to learning. Beginning with a progressive Pre - Primary school, the institution provides a seamless academic progression through primary and secondary schools to junior and degree colleges. It offers programs in Commerce, Management, Mass Media, Accounting, and Finance, addressing the diverse aspirations of students.

Recognizing the need for skilled educators, the Trust established a Teacher's Training Centre in Andheri (West) in 2009 under the B.Ed. program. That same year, it expanded its reach by founding the College of Law in Malad (West). Today, the institution boasts state-of-the-art facilities, including science and computer labs, an audio-visual room, a library, and recreational amenities, along with hygienic restrooms and a well-maintained canteen. Over 250 experienced teachers mentor students, fostering academic excellence and instilling values like honesty, respect, and diligence.

The Centre's accomplishments have been widely recognized. It was named "Best School in K-West Ward" by the Municipal Corporation of Greater Mumbai. Mr. Ajay Kaul, the Honorary Principal, received the prestigious State Award for the Best Teacher in 2002-2003.

Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)

The Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) at Clara's College remains dedicated to fostering academic excellence and institutional growth through continuous improvement. This report outlines the key initiatives undertaken during the 2024-25 academic year, focusing on:

- Curriculum Development – Enhancing academic frameworks to meet evolving educational demands.
- Faculty Enrichment – Strengthening professional development and pedagogical skills.
- Research Advancements – Promoting innovation and scholarly contributions.
- Student Support Systems – Ensuring holistic development through tailored guidance and resources.
- Industry Collaborations – Bridging academia and industry for real-world relevance.
- Infrastructure Enhancements – Upgrading facilities to support a dynamic learning environment.

Additionally, the report highlights the adoption of innovative teaching methodologies, robust feedback mechanisms, and best practices aimed at sustaining quality education. Through these efforts, IQAC reinforces its commitment to maintaining high standards and driving sustainable progress in line with the college's vision.

1. Orientation Programme for SY & TY Students (29/06/2024)

The institution organized an orientation programme for Second and Third Year students of BMS, BAF, BCOM, and BAMMC. The Principal addressed the students, providing an overview of institutional expectations, curriculum structure, examination guidelines, and student engagement activities. The session aimed to align students with the academic vision for the upcoming year.

2. FDP: NEP 2020 Syllabus Orientation (11/07/2024)

A Faculty Development Programme was held to orient staff on the NEP 2020-aligned syllabus for AY 2024–25. Facilitated by the Principal, the session explored academic reforms under NEP including credit-based learning, interdisciplinary courses, and flexibility in curriculum. Faculty were encouraged to integrate competency-based learning strategies.

3. IPR Awareness Session on AI and Innovation (16/07/2024)

The IQAC and Research Committee conducted a session titled "AI and Intellectual Property: Protecting Innovation in the Digital Age." Speaker discussed the legal framework for IP protection in AI-driven innovations and encouraged students and researchers to protect their digital creations through appropriate legal channels.

4. FDP on AI in Teaching & Research (24/07/2024)

This FDP provided insights into how Artificial Intelligence can transform pedagogy and research. Facilitated by Dr. Babita, the session discussed AI tools for automated assessment, research analytics, and personalized teaching. It aimed to enhance faculty digital competencies.

5. Orientation for FY Students (27/07/2024)

A foundational orientation was held for newly admitted students across BMS, BAF, BCOM, BAMMC, and MCOM programs. The Principal welcomed students, introduced institutional policies, and emphasized discipline, academic excellence, and holistic development.

6. Add-on Course: Hands-on Training in Canva (16–24/08/2024)

The BAMMC department offered a practical course on Canva, enabling students to develop visual content creation skills. The course focused on poster design, social media graphics, and academic presentations. Participants developed their own projects as final submissions.

7. Industrial Visit to BSE (25/09/2024)

An industrial visit to the Bombay Stock Exchange gave students exposure to financial markets and trading mechanisms. The visit included a guided tour, a lecture by BSE professionals, and a Q&A session. Students learned about market indices, investment instruments, and trading platforms.

8. Workshop on Hygiene for Health (25/09/2024)

Organized by the IQAC and WDC, this workshop emphasized personal hygiene, preventive care, and awareness of communicable diseases. Mrs. Jisha addressed the importance of lifestyle changes and routine hygiene in promoting community health.

9. Add-on Course on Negotiable Instruments Act, 1881 (26/09–07/10/2024)

A cross-disciplinary legal course introduced students to commercial laws, focusing on the Negotiable Instruments Act. Students analyzed legal scenarios related to cheque, promissory notes, and bills of exchange through practical case studies.

10. Add-on Course on Basics of Excel (27/09–09/10/2024)

This course introduced students to Microsoft Excel, covering basic functions, formulas, data sorting, and charts. The course aimed at enhancing data management skills and was particularly useful for students pursuing finance and business studies.

12. Short-Term Certificate Course on Research Methodologies (08–19/10/2024)

This research-focused course familiarized students with various research methods including qualitative, quantitative, and mixed-method approaches. Tools like SPSS, online survey platforms, and referencing software were introduced.

11. Investisiya 2024 at BSE (16/10/2024)

This program at BSE introduced students to investment strategies, stock market dynamics, and trading simulations. Organized by IQAC, the event aimed at boosting financial literacy among management students.

12. Add-on Course: Fundamental Mathematics (14–23/12/2024)

This course aimed at reinforcing basic mathematical skills among non-math background students. Topics included algebra, arithmetic, logical reasoning, and introductory statistics to support academic performance across disciplines.

13. First Year Second Orientation (17/12/2024)

The second orientation session revisited academic regulations and introduced digital learning resources. Mentoring arrangements and exam preparation strategies were also discussed.

14. Business Quiz Competition (07/01/2025)

A quiz competition tested students' knowledge in business trends, financial news, and economic events. The event encouraged analytical thinking, competitive spirit, and industry awareness.

15. Project Guidance on Questionnaire Design (15/01/2025)

Targeted at final-year students, this session guided them in developing valid questionnaires for their research projects. Concepts such as variable identification, question framing, and scaling techniques were covered.

16. Investor Awareness Program (03/02/2025)

Jointly organized by the Placement Cell and IQAC, this session educated participants on investment planning, risk management, and mutual funds. It aimed to build a responsible investor mindset.

17. Jan Jagruti Session (08/02/2025)

This awareness session discussed constitutional values, rights, and democratic duties. Students were encouraged to become responsible citizens through informed civic participation.

18. Add-on Course: Administrative Management (10–22/02/2025)

The course covered organizational behavior, managerial principles, office procedures, and public administration. Participants developed managerial skills relevant to government and private sectors.

19. Add-on Course: Digital Marketing (01–12/03/2025)

This skill-building course introduced digital tools such as Google Ads, SEO, content marketing, and analytics. Real-time campaigns and simulations allowed students to apply concepts practically.

20. Add-on Course: Soft Skills (17–27/03/2025)

Focusing on communication, teamwork, conflict resolution, and professional ethics, the course aimed at overall personality development. Role-plays and mock interviews enhanced learning outcomes.

21. AI in Predictive Analytics Session (29/03/2025)

An expert-led session discussed the integration of AI in marketing analytics. Use-cases such as customer segmentation, lead scoring, and recommendation systems were examined.

22. International Conference (05/04/2025)

IQAC organized a multidisciplinary international conference featuring papers on AI, sustainability, education reforms, and innovation. It offered a platform for scholarly exchange and collaborative research opportunities.

23. Alumni Meet (12/04/2025)

The alumni gathering fostered dialogue between graduates and current students. Alumni shared career experiences, participated in networking activities, and discussed opportunities for institutional support.

24. Medical Camp with Ekata Manch (14/04/2025)

The health camp provided general health check-ups, blood pressure, sugar testing, and basic consultations. Organized in collaboration with Ekata Manch, it supported health awareness in the college community.

25. Convocation Ceremony (23/04/2025)

The degree distribution ceremony celebrated academic accomplishments of the graduating batch. Held in the presence of dignitaries and faculty, it marked a formal culmination of students' academic journey.

✓ Action taken by IQAC Committee

• IQAC meeting held on 13th July 2024

The IQAC meeting held on 13th July 2024 discussed several important updates and actions. The committee was informed about the submission of AQAR for the academic years 2021-22 and 2022-23, as well as the IQA submission on 5th April 2024. The implementation of NEP 2020 for the academic year 2024-25 for first-year students was also discussed, along with the allocation of workloads according to the University of Mumbai syllabus. New committee members, including Dr. Alwin Menezes, Mrs. Samina Chaudhary, and students Ms. Tanvi Patil and Mr. Mohd Mauzam, were welcomed. The academic calendar for AY 2024-25 was reviewed, and updates on the events conducted up to 13th July were provided. The results for TY Semester VI were shared, with passing percentages across various courses, including 61.81% for TYBCOM, 74.41% for TYBMS, 84.21% for TYBAF, and 66.67% for TYBAMMC. Additionally, the committee was briefed about the upcoming NAAC Peer Team visit in August 2024. Recognition was given to Shri Ajay Kaul for receiving the prestigious Navbharat Education Award for his contributions to the education sector. The committee was also reminded about the AQAR submission for AY 2023-24, which is due before Diwali. Dr. Alwin Menezes suggested increasing the online presence of the college by regularly posting event details on the website to attract future admissions.

Attendance was granted to working students, provided they meet academic requirements. Finally, the committee decided to engage with professional alumni to conduct motivational sessions to aid in the personality development of current students.

- **IQAC meeting held on 19th October 2024**

The IQAC meeting held on 19th October 2024 focused on several key updates and actions. Committee members were informed about the NAAC accreditation process and the suggestions provided by the peer team. The committee also discussed various events held and upcoming ones from July 2024, along with the college's achievements, including receiving an appreciation award from the NSS unit for its blood donation contribution with Sion Hospital in March 2024. Additionally, the formation of a Readers' Club and student participation in the Avishkar Research Convention were highlighted. Following suggestions from Aslam Sir, greater efforts were directed toward enhancing placement activities, with plans for a placement drive and job fair. The finalization of NEP 2020 subject selection and workload allocation was discussed, and based on a suggestion from the student representative, it was decided to include SY students in the soft skills training provided by Techno Serve.

- **IQAC Meeting held on 31st January 2025:**

The IQAC meeting held on 19th October 2024 highlighted updates on NAAC accreditation and peer team suggestions. Members were briefed on events conducted since July 2024, student achievements in the University of Mumbai Youth Fest, and the NSS unit's appreciation award for a blood donation drive. The formation of a Readers' Club and participation in the Avishkar Research Convention were noted. Placement efforts were intensified with plans for a drive and job fair. NEP 2020 subject selection and workload were finalized, and it was agreed to include SY students in Techno Serve's soft skills training.

- **IQAC Meeting held on 26th April 2025:**

In the IQAC meeting, members were updated on events held since January 2025 and informed about the declaration of MCom Sem III and I results, with top scorers highlighted. Admissions for third-year students began in April, while second-year admissions will follow University norms. The workload and committee list for AY 2025–26 were finalized, along with the academic calendar. The college initiated the process for autonomous status and decided to collect students' preferences for add-on courses during admission.

Universities were discussed for skill development. Strategies to boost student intake through coaching classes, junior colleges, and social media were considered, along with outreach to colleges organizing job fairs and placement drives to enhance student internship and placement opportunities.

Feedback Mechanism

These reports reflect the institution's dedication to continuous quality enhancement in academics and administration. They showcase initiatives aimed at aligning curriculum, research, and student development with evolving industry and educational standards.

1. Teachers Feedback on Syllabus 2024-25 (Semester - I / III / V)

The Teachers' feedback on the syllabus for the academic year 2024-2025 reveals generally positive responses. The majority of teachers (71.4%) agree that the aim and objectives of the syllabus are clear to both teachers and students. A significant portion (61.5%) strongly believes that the syllabus includes modern and advanced topics, while 78.6% agree that there is a good balance between theory and practical aspects.

Regarding resources, 92.9% of teachers affirm that book facilities and amenities like projectors and software are available in the department. The majority (71.4%) express satisfaction with the teaching methods, and 85.7% agree that the program outcomes are well defined and relevant. Additionally, 78.6% of teachers feel that the course content adequately meets student needs, while 71.4% believe the syllabus equips students with necessary technical skills for the industry.

However, 64.3% of teachers agree that the overall academic environment could be improved.

Key recommendations include timely updates to the curriculum, providing learning materials to enhance student learning, and introducing more practical and skill-oriented courses in addition to theory-based ones.

1.2. Teachers Feedback on Syllabus 2024-25 Semester II/IV/VI)

The teachers' feedback on the syllabus for the academic year 2024-2025 (Semesters II, IV, and VI) indicates generally positive responses. A majority of teachers (68.8%) agree that the aim and objectives of the syllabus are clearly defined. 55.6% strongly agree that the syllabus covers modern and advanced topics, while 52.6% feel there is a balanced

mix of theory and practical elements. Regarding resources, 62.5% of teachers agree that book facilities and other amenities such as projectors and software are available in the department. A strong 75% express satisfaction with the teaching methods, and 81.3% strongly agree that the program outcomes of the syllabus are well defined. Furthermore, 75% of teachers agree that the curriculum is relevant, and 68.8% believe the course content meets student needs. Additionally, 62.5% think the syllabus equips students with necessary technical skills for industry demands, and 62.5% also agree that the overall academic environment is good. Key recommendations include the timely update of the curriculum, the provision of learning materials for better student learning, and the introduction of more practical and skill-oriented courses alongside theory courses.

2. Students Feedback on Syllabus 2024–25 (Semester I/III/V)

In the academic year 2024–25, the college collected feedback from 227 students across Semesters I, III, and V regarding the syllabus. Results show that 78.6% strongly agreed the syllabus objectives were clear, 76.8% felt it fulfilled their learning needs, 82.01% found it value-based, and 83.9% considered it skill-oriented. About 78.6% reported easy access to textbooks and reference materials, and a similar percentage agreed the syllabus enhanced employability. However, 76.8% felt the syllabus was difficult and stressful. Additionally, 82.1% expressed that it encouraged them to pursue higher studies. Overall, 90.83% of students participated, indicating high engagement and general satisfaction with the syllabus, while suggesting a need to manage academic stress.

2.1. Students Feedback on Syllabus 2024–25 (Semester II/IV/VI)

The college conducted student feedback on the syllabus for Semesters II, IV, and VI during the academic year 2024–25, involving 310 students who responded to nine key questions related to syllabus objectives, relevance, skill orientation, learning resources, and academic interest. The results showed that 48.1% of students strongly agreed that the objectives of the syllabus were clearly mentioned, while 47.7% strongly felt that the syllabus fulfilled their learning needs. Additionally, 54.8% of students strongly agreed that the syllabus was value-based and 55.2% recognized it as skill-oriented. A high percentage, 63.9%, found easy access to prescribed textbooks and reference materials.

syllabus was difficult and stressful, 47.7% reported that it fostered interest in pursuing higher studies. Furthermore, 54.8% agreed that the prescribed books were easily available. Overall, the feedback indicates that 74.83% of students positively engaged with and responded to the feedback exercise, reflecting general satisfaction with the syllabus while highlighting areas for further refinement.

3. Students Feedback on Teachers 2024–25 (Semester I/III/V)

In the academic year 2024–25, the college conducted a structured student feedback survey for teachers instructing Semesters I, III, and V. The feedback focused on key teaching parameters including subject knowledge, communication skills, sincerity and commitment, the ability to relate course content to broader real-world contexts, accessibility for student consultation, and the design of assessments to evaluate student understanding. Students assigned ratings on a five-point scale, where scores below 2 were classified as "Satisfactory," scores between 2.1 and 3.7 as "Good," and scores between 3.8 and 5 as "Excellent." Analysis of the feedback revealed that 94% of the faculty (16 out of 17 teachers) were rated as "Excellent," while 6% (1 teacher) received a "Good" rating. No faculty member received a "Satisfactory" rating. The results demonstrate a strong level of satisfaction among students regarding the quality of teaching, with the majority of faculty members consistently achieving high standards across all evaluated criteria.

3.1. Students Feedback on Teachers 2024–25 (Semester II/IV/VI)

The students' feedback for the academic year 2024-2025 (Semesters II, IV, VI) reveals strong satisfaction with faculty performance. Out of 16 faculty members, 13 received an "Excellent" rating, while 3 were rated "Good." The feedback assessed teachers on various factors such as knowledge, communication skills, commitment, ability to engage students, and the integration of course material with real-world issues. Faculty were also evaluated on their accessibility and the effectiveness of assessments. Based on the ratings, 12 faculty members were categorized as "Excellent" (average ratings 3.8-5), and 2 were categorized as "Good" (average ratings 2.1-3.7). Overall, the feedback indicates that most faculty members performed excellently, with students expressing high satisfaction.

4. Alumni Feedback on Syllabus 2024–25

The Alumni Feedback on the Syllabus for the academic year 2024–25 highlights a generally positive response from the 30 alumni surveyed. Approximately 85.9% of respondents agreed that the curriculum is appropriate, and 84.4% found it beneficial for their career growth. Specifically, 66.7% of alumni strongly agreed that the course curriculum fulfilled their expectations, while 60% strongly agreed that the programme helped in developing their personality. Regarding reading material availability, 50% strongly agreed it was easily accessible. Additionally, 66.7% strongly agreed that the syllabus enhances employability, and 63.3% felt intellectually stimulated by the course content. Furthermore, 60% strongly agreed that the syllabus objectives were clearly defined, and 50% believed the course met contemporary requirements. Overall, the feedback indicates alumni satisfaction with the syllabus, alongside suggestions to introduce more job-oriented courses, update the curriculum based on emerging needs, and align syllabus revisions more closely with employability goals.

5. Student Satisfaction Survey (SSS) Feedback Analysis

Clara's College of Commerce conducted an online **Student Satisfaction Survey (SSS)** to assess various aspects of the teaching-learning process and improve the institution's educational quality. The survey gathered responses from students across all years and programs.

Key Findings:

1. The survey recorded 379 student responses across various programs, with a majority enrolled in B.Com and within the age group of 19 to 21 years, reflecting a primarily undergraduate student population.
2. A high response authenticity was confirmed, as 97.63% of students indicated it was their first time completing the survey, ensuring the credibility of the feedback collected.
3. Syllabus coverage was reported positively, with 52.8% stating that 85–100% of the syllabus was completed, indicating good academic planning and delivery.
4. Teacher preparation received mixed reviews—while 44.3% found it satisfactory or thorough, about 55% reported indifferent to poor preparation, suggesting inconsistency across faculty.

5. Teaching effectiveness was largely praised, with over 92% of students describing the teaching approach as good to excellent, and communication also rated highly effective by the majority.
6. The internal evaluation process was deemed fair by nearly 90% of respondents, reinforcing trust in academic assessments within the institution.
7. Students acknowledged consistent feedback on assignments and effective mentoring support, though some recommended more personalized follow-up and guidance.
8. There was strong recognition of the institution's use of student-centric and experiential learning methods, yet a small segment felt these were not applied regularly or uniformly.
9. A significant majority appreciated efforts to develop soft skills, life skills, and employability, and also noted the use of ICT tools like projectors and digital resources in teaching.
10. Student suggestions emphasized the need for improved infrastructure (e.g., lift access, ACs), more practical learning, better teacher-student communication, digital integration, and structured feedback systems to further enhance the teaching-learning experience

An online quiz competition was organized by the Cultural Committee to observe World Population Day. Open to all classes, it aimed to test students' knowledge on population issues including demographic trends, global population growth, and related challenges. A total of 27 students actively participated in the event through an online platform. Upon completion of the quiz, all participants were awarded certificates in recognition of their engagement and awareness.

- **Social Wave Fest (14th–18th July 2024)**

Conducted by the IQAC and BAMMC Department, this intercollegiate online fest celebrated World Social Media Day. Events included creative T-shirt and poster making competitions designed to highlight the importance and influence of social media. Students from various colleges across Mumbai participated and submitted entries online over a four-day period. The top three winners were declared from different institutions and all participants received certificates for their involvement. The fest successfully promoted digital expression, creativity, and intercollegiate collaboration.

- **Fine Arts and Performing Arts Competition (3rd August 2024)**

Organized by the Cultural Committee, this event showcased student talent in a wide range of categories such as singing, dance, stand-up comedy, painting, rangoli, mehendi, and nail art. The objective was to promote leadership, creativity, and expression through the performing and fine arts. The competition saw enthusiastic participation from various courses, and winners were declared in each category. Certificates were distributed to all winners and participants.

- **57th Inter-Collegiate Youth Festival (8th August – September 2024)**

- **Traditional Day (Jan 4):** Celebrated cultural heritage with traditional attire representing various Indian states. The event also featured dance and music performances that reflected India's rich diversity.

The events fostered self-expression, inclusivity, and community spirit, offering students a break from academics to bond over shared cultural experiences.

- **Formal Day (16th January 2025)**

This event promoted professionalism by encouraging students to dress in formal attire. In addition to dressing formally, students engaged in reflective discussions on career aspirations and personal development. Questions like "What does wearing formals mean to you?" and "How does dressing professionally impact your confidence?" inspired students to think critically about the role of

professionalism in academic and workplace environments. The event aimed to instill confidence, discipline, and corporate awareness among students preparing for future career opportunities.

- **Marketing Fest – Lavishta (30th January 2025)**

The Cultural Committee hosted a marketing-themed fest for BCOM, BMS, BAF, BAMMC, and MCOM students. Events included a vibrant Food Fiesta with 16 food stalls, along with games, mehendi, and nail art stalls. Competitions in advertising and sales were conducted, judged by industry professionals Mr. Gavin Gonsalves, Mrs. Jisha Varghese, and Ms. Minakshi Kandari. A total of 88 students participated across various roles. The fest served as a practical platform for students to exhibit creativity, business acumen, and organizational skills. Winners, volunteers, and participants were awarded certificates, and the event received appreciation for its successful execution and enthusiastic participation.

Alumni Association

GREEN CLUB

The **Green Club Report** is to highlight the club's initiatives in promoting environmental awareness and sustainability within the institution. It aims to document activities such as tree plantation drives, waste management programs, energy conservation efforts, and eco-friendly campaigns. 1. **Tree Plantation Drive (25/06/2024)**

A documentary titled "*Expedition*" was screened to 76 student beneficiaries, highlighting urgent climate issues and the need for environmental responsibility. Resource person, Mr. Reetesh R. Singh emphasized the significance of climate action and inspired students to actively participate in environmental conservation.

2. National Level Online Quiz Competition on World Earth Day (22/04/2025)

The Green Club organized a National Level Online Quiz Competition on World Earth Day on 22nd April 2025 to promote environmental awareness and sustainability. Held via Google Forms, the quiz featured 15 multiple-choice questions on topics like climate change, biodiversity, and sustainable practices. a. Awareness Session for Second Year and Third Year Students (04/07/2024)

An Anti-Ragging Awareness Session was conducted on 04/07/2024 by Ms. Kajal Jaiswal under the joint initiative of IQAC and the Anti-Ragging Committee. The session aimed to educate students on the legal, emotional, and academic consequences of ragging, while promoting a safe and inclusive campus environment. Disciplinary actions against ragging and support mechanisms for victims were discussed in detail. The orientation also involved freshers and parents to ensure awareness from the outset. A total of 108 participants, including students and faculty, benefited from the programme. The event reinforced the institution's commitment to a ragging-free and student-friendly learning space.

b. Awareness Session for First Year 25/07/2024

On 25/07/2024, an Anti-Ragging Awareness Programme was held for first-year students, organized by the IQAC and Anti-Ragging Committee, with Ms. Kajal Jaiswal as the resource person. The session focused on informing students about the harmful effects of ragging and the serious disciplinary actions it can lead to, including legal and academic consequences. Freshers and their parents were oriented on college rules and support systems in place to prevent ragging. The programme also stressed the emotional toll ragging can have on victims, such as stress, depression, or even dropping out. Emphasis was placed on creating a respectful and secure campus

atmosphere. The session saw active participation from 100 attendees, including students and faculty.

c. Poster Making Competition 07/08/2024

An Anti-Ragging Poster Making Competition was conducted on 07/08/2024, organized by the IQAC and Anti-Ragging Committee. The event aimed to raise awareness among students about the harmful effects of ragging and promote a ragging-free campus environment. Ms. Ruchita Pandhare judged the competition, while Dr. Madhukar Gitte, Principal of the college, appreciated and encouraged the participants. A total of 64 students from various streams actively participated, creatively showcasing messages against ragging. The competition helped students express their thoughts on the psychological and social impact of ragging. Prizes were awarded to the top five students based on creativity and message clarity. Participants were acknowledged with certificates. The event reflected students' understanding of the seriousness of ragging and their commitment to a safe and inclusive campus.

One Day International Multi-Disciplinary Conference on "Role of Artificial Intelligence in Sustainable Development"

Clara's College of Commerce, in collaboration with the University of Mumbai, organized a One Day International Multi-Disciplinary Conference on "*Role of Artificial Intelligence in Sustainable Development*" on 5th April 2025. The event was conducted online via Zoom and coordinated by the IQAC and Research Committee. The conference aimed to explore the potential of AI in advancing sustainable development through improved efficiency and innovation across various sectors. The conference featured diverse sub-themes including AI in commerce, health, education, agriculture, cybersecurity, and more.

The event commenced with an inaugural session featuring speeches by Principal Dr. Madhukar Gitte and Chief Guest Dr. Rajanish Kamat, followed by a plenary session addressed by esteemed speakers including Dr. Arun Chainit, Dr. Geeta Balakrishnan, and Dr. Kinnarry Thakkar. Technical sessions were held in three parallel tracks where 104 research papers were presented by 236 participants. Best paper awards were given for each track. The conference concluded with a valedictory session and a vote of thanks.

The conference successfully deepened participants' understanding of AI's role in sustainable

development, fostered academic collaborations, and contributed actionable ideas for the integration of AI into socio-economic and environmental strategies.


The Road Ahead

In alignment with the **National Education Policy (NEP) 2020** and the revised **10-point NAAC assessment criteria**, the institution is committed to adopting a holistic and multidisciplinary approach to education. 3. **Increased Industry and Field Exposure:** The frequency of industrial visits, field studies, and study tours will be increased to provide experiential learning opportunities and real-world insights, promoting interdisciplinary learning as envisaged in NEP 2020.
4. **Faculty Development and Capacity Building:** Faculty Development Programs (FDPs), in collaboration with universities and research institutions, will be conducted regularly to upgrade pedagogical techniques and research competencies, supporting the NAAC metric of *Teaching-Learning and Evaluation*.
5. **Encouraging Continuous Professional Learning:** Faculty will be encouraged to enroll in Massive Open Online Courses (MOOCs), attend national/international workshops, and acquire certifications in emerging areas of knowledge, fostering lifelong learning and quality enhancement.
6. **Promotion of Research and Innovation:** A robust research ecosystem will be cultivated

by encouraging faculty to undertake funded research projects, publish in peer-reviewed journals, and present at academic conferences, thus contributing to *Research, Innovation, and Extension* under the NAAC framework.

7. **Upgrading Infrastructure and Learning Resources:** Focus will be placed on enhancing physical and digital infrastructure, including smart classrooms, research laboratories, and access to e-resources, thereby improving *Infrastructure and Learning Resources* and aligning with NEP's vision for a digitally empowered education.
8. **Student-Centric Initiatives for Holistic Development:** Programs such as mentorship schemes, career counseling, bridge courses, and skill development workshops will be implemented to support students' academic and professional growth, adhering to *Student Support and Progression* standards.
9. **Community Engagement and Social Responsibility:** In accordance with the *Institutional Values* criterion, the college will encourage student involvement in social outreach, sustainability drives, and extension activities, fostering civic responsibility and ethical leadership.
